



On Tuesday, May 6, 2025, voters living in the White Cloud Public Schools district will have the opportunity to consider a bond proposal that, if approved, would result in \$28.4 million for district-wide facility improvements with a ZERO TAX-RATE INCREASE over the 2024 levy expected.

This bond would allow for safety and security upgrades, while also addressing aging facilities to provide modernized learning and athletic environments. The proposal comes as a result of in-depth evaluations by school staff, parents and community members to create a long-term plan that addresses the current and future needs of district facilities and programs.

The Varsity girls competed in Scottsville with 13 other teams in a competitive EQ meet. The girls finished 7/14 with 57 points. Courtney Coon was 8<sup>th</sup> in the 100 H and 7<sup>th</sup> in the 300 H. All of the relay teams earned points and medals. Justice Dixon took first in the 100 M (13.1) followed by Kiah Rogers' 2<sup>nd</sup> place PR (13.7). Kiah was also 1<sup>st</sup> in the 200 M with a PR (28.4). Gabriella Dakin was 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 200 (30.4) and 1<sup>st</sup> in the long jump (13'11). Keira Maike took 1<sup>st</sup> in the 400 with a PR (1:06), 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 800 with another PR (2:40) Natalie Dyke PR'd in the 800 (3:01), took 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 1600 with another PR (6:46).

Courtney Coon, Payten Bird and Caedance Traynor swept the 100 H against Kent City. Courtney PR time of 18.07 1<sup>st</sup> place, Payten Bird 19.5 PR was 2<sup>nd</sup> and Caedy ran a 19.7.
