David's winning entry makes a creative hybrid of two plants, the weeping fig and purple coneflowers, to solve an environmental problem and help people in the community.


STEM Science students in Ms. Claflin's class spent time learning about plants and how plants might be used to solve real-life problems, such as air pollution, erosion, and climate change.

Quiz Bowl Team Shines on National Scene

White Cloud's dedicated and talented quiz bowl team placed 15th in the nation on January 30 at the pre-national Jesse Brown Small-School Showcase hosted by Glasgow, Kentucky.

Glasgow is the 2019 defending small-school national champions for Class B, C, and D public academic institutions.

The Indians were the only Michigan school that qualified and were invited to participate in this star-studded field that included championship squads from Alabama, Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin.

To compete in this prestigious tournament, a team had to have been one of the perennial top 15 teams in the nation on a consistent basis dating back to 2002. Just 24 schools met that criterion.

White Cloud was invited because it has finished in the top nine of the United States 12 times since 2004, including a second-place finish in the nation in 2005.

According to tournament director Todd Garrison of Glasgow High School, the 24 teams that competed on January 30 had won 11 national titles, had garnered nine runner-up, 40 top fives, and 63 top 10 finishes at the NAQT Small-School National Championships since 2002.

At day's end on January 30, Class B Russell (Kentucky) and Class B Glasgow (Kentucky) captured championship and runner-up honors, respectively.

Class C White Cloud played brilliantly in the 11-round tournament, especially with scintillating victories over Class B Adirondack (New York) 190-170, Class B Southwestern (Illinois) 285-160, and defending Class B national champion Glasgow (Kentucky) 295-85.

A five-point loss to Class B Cloverleaf (Ohio) 215-220, and a five-point defeat to Class B Salem (Ohio) 230-235 dropped the Indians from 6th to 15th place in the final standings.

Computer technology has allowed the Indians to compete virtually all season using platforms such as Zoom, Discord, and Google Meet, along with buzzin.live for the buzzer system.

White Cloud's 2020-2021 team is composed of senior cocaptain Parker Karnes and Janessa Shepard, senior Heather Grveles, junior Anthony Solis-Victoria, sophomores Malachi Graves and Zane Keith, and youngsters Wyatt Karnes and Mason D'Lamater.

Quiz Bowl Team wins CSAA; Advances to State and Nationals

White Cloud's formidable quiz bowl team continued its winning ways in March by annexing the 2021 CSAA dual championship with an unblemished record in the Silver Division.

Big Rapids captured the dual title in the Gold Division.

Significantly, White Cloud downed the Cardinals 205-155 during the first week of the league's crossover matches between the two divisions.

Senior co-captains Parker Karnes and Janessa Shepard were selected by CSAA coaches as recipients of coveted 1st team all-conference accolades for the 4th consecutive year, which is a White Cloud quiz bowl school record.

Rounding out White Cloud's varsity championship contingent were letter winners senior Heather Grveles, junior Anthony Solis-Victoria, and sophomores Malachi Graves and Zane Keith.

Future stars on the team were 8th grader Wyatt Karnes and 5th grader Mason D'Lamater.

Karnes and Shepard also qualified for the Individuals' National Championship, held April 11, for the second consecutive season.

Wyatt Karnes qualified to the Middle School National Championship for Individuals, scheduled for April 25.

As a varsity team, White Cloud qualified for the Class C-D State Meet, held April 17, and to the NAQT Small-School National Championship for Class B, C, and D public institutions on April 24-25.

White Cloud holds the all-time Michigan record in Class C-D, having qualified for 32 years to the State Finals.

2021 marks the 24th season that a White Cloud contingent has advanced to the National Championship. The Indians have finished in the top nine of the U.S. 12 times since 2004.

White Cloud's highest national standing was 2nd place in 2005 behind national champion Danville, Kentucky.

In 2004 and 2005, because of extraordinary team depth, White Cloud qualified two separate teams to nationals. In 2004, the two Indian squads placed 3rd and 5th, respectively, in the nation. In 2005, White Cloud placed 2nd and 8th.

Battling through COVID

The COVID-19 pandemic has posed numerous obstacles for quiz bowl teams around the country; in fact,

White Cloud's only in-person competitions this school year occurred during the CSAA dual-meet season.

Since 1987, White Cloud's regular-season schedule has been rigorous and challenging, but the 2020-2021 season has been its most diverse prior to the annual national championship.

All of White Cloud's other invitationals and TV appearances have been conducted virtually online. The benefit of that situation enabled White Cloud to compete head-to-head virtually for maximum exposure yet minimum cost against mostly Class A powerhouses from Canada and the following 23 states: Alabama, California, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas, Vermont, and Wisconsin.

Two of White Cloud's momentous moments this season occurred when the Indians vanquished a team from Class A Beavercreek (Ohio) 465-105 at the Detroit Country Day Invitational and Class B Glasgow (Kentucky) 465-110 at the Jesse Brown Showcase in Kentucky. Those schools were the 2019 defending national champions in their respective divisions.

"Coach Smith and I are proud of our sapient scholars," Coach McHattie said.

Quiz Bowl Team Places 10th in Nation

White Cloud's formidable quiz bowl squad ended the 2020-2021 campaign by placing first in the league (March 17), fourth in the state (April 17), and 10th in the nation (April 24).

The team competed superbly at the National Championship, White Cloud's 24th. After nine rounds of intense competition, the Indians placed 10th in NAQT's "Very-Small-School Division," consisting of Class C and D public schools, and 27th in the larger division consisting of Class B, C, and D squads combined.

It is the 13th time since 2004 that the Indians have finished in the top 10 of the United States in their division.

Five of White Cloud's opponents were Class B schools, and the team defeated three of its four Class C adversaries.

White Cloud outscored Class C Gatlinburg-Pittman from Tennessee 280-215, vanquished Class C Jasper from Missouri 225-80, and topped Class C Illini West from Illinois 300-145.

The Indians lost 290-240 to 3rd place Class C finisher Cooperstown, New York. White Cloud also lost a 170-160 nailbiter against Class B Chase High School from North Carolina.

White Cloud's 5 Class B rivals included Chase (North Carolina), Macomb (Illinois), Cloverleaf (Ohio), Glasgow B (Kentucky), and West Point (Alabama).

Senior co-captains Parker Karnes and Janessa Shepard performed well at nationals, averaging 46.11 and 23.33 points per game, respectively.

Karnes and Shepard were Michigan's 3rd and 4th highest individual scorers at nationals, placing behind two first-team All-Americans representing Roscommon and Whitmore Lake.

Also performing impressively were sophomore Zane Keith, junior Anthony Solis-Victoria, sophomore Malachi Graves, and senior Heather Grveles.

Wyatt Karnes, the youngest member of the team, was quarantined due to contact tracing associated with COVID-19 and was unable to compete.

On Sunday, April 11, prior to NAQT's team Nationals, Karnes and Shepard competed in the online Individuals' National Championship for the best Class A, B, C, and D players

combined in the United States. They finished 2nd and 3rd, respectively, among all Class C players in the nation.

Both also were selected by the national committee to compete in 2020, but COVID-19 forced the cancellation of the event.

Wyatt Karnes also qualified in 2021 to the Individuals' National Championship for his age group but was unable to compete.

On April 17, White Cloud finished 4th in the seeded Class C-D NAQT State Meet, hosted online by DeWitt High School. It was the 32nd appearance for White Cloud,

which is a Michigan record for Class C-D quiz bowl squads.

In the afternoon playoffs in round 8, White Cloud put its 6-1 record against 7-0 Roscommon in a bid for second place. With one tossup remaining in the match and the score tied at 220, Roscommon's 1st team All-American Jackson Thiel scored to give the Bucks the victory. That loss dropped White Cloud into 3rd place. In the consolation match, Calumet edged White Cloud, 235-215.

Parker Karnes earned 2nd team All-State honors as a result of his averaging 58.33 points per contest. He missed making 1st team by 0.84 points per match. Shepard just missed earning 2nd team All-State, falling short by 4.33 points per round.

Parker Karnes was selected by his teammates and coaches as the 2020-2021 recipient of the Bill Martin Most Valuable Player award. Last October 17, Karnes also earned the Brian Derks Trophy for being White Cloud's leading scorer at the online Fulton-Middleton Invitational. This replaced White Cloud's Jan Rademacher Memorial Invitational, which was canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In their journey, Jones and Abbott explore the concepts of race and difference through stories that begin with their youthful experiences in rural northwestern Michigan.



"White Cloud authors sharing their writing processes, advice, and experiences directly with White


Cloud students...it doesn't get much better than that!" she exclaimed.

April 1, 2021 was National Take Down Tobacco Day, and the BreatheWell Action Team partnered with the White Cloud Media Club (WCTV) to interview Daniel Ament.

In 2019, Daniel was a 16-year-old from Michigan and the first-ever double lung transplant recipient due to vaping-related illnesses in the world.

WCTV students produced a 19-minute film highlighting Ament's traumatic experience with vaping and his tragic outcome.

The film, "The Story of Daniel Ament," has been nominated for the West Michigan Student Showcase: Digital Media category.

"This was such an awesome project in so many ways," said Mrs. Sara Gorman, media club adviser.

"I loved getting to experience our White Cloud students networking with and learning from Daniel about the harsh realities of vaping," she added. "This project addresses a major need within our student culture today: vape and tobacco education and reform.

Connecting teens with local businesses and community

organizations, such as Headway Coalition and Spectrum Health, while advocating for changes in our world today, is what it's all about.

"It was a very cool project," Mrs. Gorman exclaimed.

Kathy Broome, Mr. Canning said, "has a wonderful personal and literacy connection with our students."

Kathy helps students a few days each week by engaging them in an interactive read-aloud based on their science standards, helping them to find a book they would fall in love with, and making the library a place students love.

She also helps students search out new book titles, browses thrift stores for books that can enhance the school's collection, and "came in many days during the summer to organize and keep our books 'ready' for the next reader," Mr. Canning noted.

Even during a year when Kathy was not able to be in the building with students, she works from home to foster reading and get books ready for students to enjoy.

"She does this all because she values literacy and knows that students who don't like to read, just haven't found the right book," Mr. Canning said.

"We value her expertise and are thankful for her willingness to provide this gift for our students," he added.



The meal sign-up page is located on the White Cloud Public Schools website under Food Services & Menu - Meal Orders.


You must sign up by noon on the Sunday prior to that week's Monday pick-up date and time. Information needed for
