Mr. Denslow and the White Cloud Band Christmas Concert and Toys for Tots drive collects and distributes toys for so many children throughout Newaygo County.


Finally, Ms. Lyon and the junior high student council collected items for community donations.

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The Board of Education meets the third Monday of each month in the HS Collaboration Room 306. Meetings are open to the public, and begin at 7:30 pm.

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

# More Volunteer Mentors Wanted

Across the United States, suicide rates among young people aged 10-17 have increased by 56 percent since 2007, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Suicide is now the second leading cause of death among young people aged 10-24.

These numbers are scary to me, as they should be for any of you who are reading this.

I have been a teacher in White Cloud for more than 32 years, and I have slowly seen changes in the students. It is much more difficult for them to focus, and behaviors have gotten worse.

I felt the strong need to help do something about our struggling students beyond my classroom. So, in the 2018-2019 school year, I started a mentor program at our elementary school.

Nine volunteers made the choice to help make a positive difference in the life of a child. Some of them are Pastor J.R. Schick, Herman Becker, Amy Stockwell, Dawn Geigle, and Adam Chiles.

They came to the elementary school one day a week for 20-30 minutes and played a game with a student. Just this little amount of time made amazing differences.

Our students are in desperate need of more mentor volunteers. Can you spare 20-30 minutes a week, or do you know someone who can?

If so, you can stop at the elementary school office to pick up the necessary paperwork to be filled out, or call the school at 231-689-2300 and ask to have it sent to you.

Nearly 200 people attended to learn more about Title programs and what makes the elementary a Title 1 school.

Title I is a federal act that provides financial assistance to local educational agencies and to schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families.

Money, in the form of grants, is used to provide additional academic support and learning opportunities to help low-achieving children master challenging curricula and meet state standards in core academic subjects.

For example, funds support extra instruction in reading and mathematics, as well as special preschool, after-school, and summer programs to extend and reinforce the regular school curriculum.

During Family Night, students worked with their parents at a variety of stations devoted to STEAM – Science, Technology,

# White Cloud Shines at Jan Rademacher Quiz Bowl Tournament

Four and one-half months of assiduous preparation, from June to the middle of October, enabled White Cloud's young but talented 20-person quiz bowl team to perform well on October 12 at the nationally sanctioned Jan Rademacher Memorial Quiz Bowl Invitational, hosted by White Cloud High School.



Shepard won a tie-breaker to finish as camp champion in her division.

Solis-Victoria placed third overall in that ACE individual camp championship race, giving White Cloud players a one-two-three sweep.

This prestigious tournament honors the memories of White Cloud's Jan Rademacher, former volunteer quiz bowl coach, and Army Specialist Brian Derks, former quiz bowl captain and leading scorer).

The tournament attracted 27 entries from 14 quiz bowl powerhouses, 13 of which were state finalists last year: Berrien Springs, Big Rapids Crossroads Charter Academy, DeWitt, East Grand Rapids, Holland, Interlochen, Ionia, Kalamazoo Christian, Kent City, Mt. Pleasant, Muskegon Orchard View, Roscommon, Traverse City Central, and White Cloud.

White Cloud's varsity A squad won Tier C of the 12th grade division with three underclassmen: juniors Parker Karnes and Janessa Shepard, sophomore Anthony Solis-Victoria, and senior Brendan Lodden.

As a result, the team qualified to the 2020 Class C-D state meet and to the 2020 NAQT National Championship, both of which are held in April.

White Cloud has qualified to the Michigan High School state finals for 31 seasons, which continues to be a state record in Class C-D and is bested only by Class A Detroit Catholic Central and Class B Detroit Country Day, with 33 state finals qualifications each.

This also marks the 23rd year that an Indian squad has qualified to the quiz bowl Nationals.

White Cloud has 12 top nine finishes in the United States in the small-school division (Class B, C, and D schools combined) since 2004, placing as high as 2nd in the country.

## Karnes, Shepard Lead the Way

At the conclusion of the tournament, Karnes was awarded the coveted Brian Derks Trophy as White Cloud's leading varsity scorer.

Karnes and Shepard are the only two players in White Cloud's quiz bowl program to earn first team all-conference honors as freshmen.

Both are returning state and national qualifiers, and both tied for top honors at last summer's ACE Quiz bowl camp.

## Other WC Teams Perform Well

White Cloud's varsity B quintet placed 4th in the final standings of Tier C in the 12th grade division. Junior Ian Pierce, with 80 points, senior Jasmine Higgs, junior Heather Grveles, sophomore Breana Lodden, and sophomore Savannah Sanford comprised this squad.

White Cloud's 9th grade A" quintet won in the freshman division. Gaby Reeve paced the Indians' attack, and was joined by Wyatt Karnes, Charlotte Karnes, Sierra Thompson, and Chloe Higgs.

The 9th grade B team placed 3rd, led by freshman Zane Keith, Malachi Graves, Austin Hancock, Connor Bragg, Bethany Lodden, and Alyssa Michaelis.

The coaching staff wishes to congratulate White Cloud's 20 players and thanks all of the officials and helpers for making the invitational another major success.

# Strait Earns Second All-State Volleyball Honor



Alexis Strait made it two years running when she was named third team all-state by the Michigan Interscholastic Volleyball Coaches Association.

Alexis also earned all-state volleyball honors in 2018.

Names of potential all-state players are submitted by coaches to the MIVCA prior to and during the volleyball season.

Region representatives evaluate as many players as possible around the state as the season progresses.

All MIVCA varsity coaches and the representatives in each region meet to select their respective region teams.

A varsity coach must be a MIVCA member, nominate their player for all-region, and the player must be selected to their region team to be considered at the state level.

Once a player has been selected to the region by the varsity coaches, regions nominate players to move on to the state level. At this level, representatives are looking for impact players throughout the state, not just at their region level.

Each class selects three teams at the state level plus honorable mention. Senior all-state players who are selected to first, second or third teams are invited to the MIVCA/Adidas All-Star Match, while all players receive a certificate for their accomplishment.

More than 210 players are recognized at this level every year.

## Adult Fans: High School Sports' Biggest Challenge

Inappropriate adult behavior at high school athletic events in Michigan has reached epidemic proportion.

When more than 2,000 high school athletic directors were asked in a recent national survey what they like least about their job, 62.3 percent said it was "dealing with aggressive parents and adult fans".

And the men and women who wear the black and white stripes agree. In fact, almost 80 percent of officials quit after the first two years on the job, and unruly parents are cited as the reason why. As a result, there is a growing shortage of high school officials here in Michigan, and in some sports like wrestling, swimming & diving and track & field, the shortage is severe. No officials means no more games.

If you are a parent attending a high school athletic event this fall, you can help by following these six guidelines:

1. **Act your age.** You are, after all, an adult. Act in a way that makes your family and school proud.
2. **Don't live your life vicariously through your kids.** High school sports are for them, not you. Your family's reputation is not determined by how well your children perform on the field of play.

3. **Let your kid talk to the coach rather than you doing it for them.** High school athletes can become more confident, independent and capable – but only when their parents don't jump in and solve their problems for them.
4. **Stay in your lane.** No coaching or officiating from the sidelines. Your role is to be a responsible, supportive parent, not a coach or official.
5. **Remember, participating in a high school sport is not about getting a college scholarship.** According to the NCAA, only about two percent of all high school athletes are awarded a sports scholarship, and the total value of the scholarship is only about \$18,000.
6. **Make sure your kids know you love watching them play.** Do not critique your child's performance on the ride home. Participating in sports is about character development, learning and having fun – not winning and losing.

Purchasing a ticket to an athletic event does not give you the right to be rude, disrespectful or verbally abusive. Cheer loud and be proud, but be responsible and respectful. The future of high school sports in Michigan is dependent on you.
