According to the quartet, these 5th graders were the best, most attentive group they have performed for all year!





Meijer Gardens a Treat for Junior High


Mr. Dipple brought seven junior high students to Meijer Gardens on April 11.

White Cloud Wins CSAA Chess Championship

In an extraordinary display of strategic brilliance, the White Cloud Chess Club went 5-0 while checkmating all of the competition, capturing the 2025 CSAA Chess Championship in their inaugural entry into the league.

Finishing behind White Cloud were teams from Grant, Kent City, Newaygo, Reed City, and Big Rapids.

Delivering a sensational season from start to finish, the Indians set a firm foundation for years to come.

The Cloud overwhelmed Big Rapids 23-2 victory in their first triumph of the season. In their next contest, the checkmate crew prevailed over Newaygo 18-7.

White Cloud gutted out an impressive 15.5-9.5 win against a Grant squad that had reigned supreme in the CSAA for the past two seasons. Squaring up against Kent City, the team seized the CSAA Chess Championship outright, defeating the Eagles 16-9. The chess crew then outmatched Reed City in fine fashion with a 24-1 victory.

The chess masters executed their fine individual skills at the CSAA chess tournament hosted at Big Rapids. Captain Jarrett Warlick earned all-conference honors with a 5-0 record, as did Brian Loveless with his 4-1 tournament record.

Jaaron Steffes grabbed three wins and all-conference honorable mention, while Wyatt Karnes and Reece Johnson snatched two wins to complete the event.

The Indians posted a 111.5-37.5 overall team record and an .743 winning percentage.

Captain Warlick turned in a magnificent 28-2 overall performance in the conference. Freshman Loveless orchestrated a stellar 24.5-5.5 win total, Karnes posted an 18-7 finish, Johnson was 20-11, and Steffes achieved a 19-1 posting.

At a critical time for the group, Reece Hewitt dictated the pace in his matches, capturing two wins in the process. Caxton Knight rounded out an all-around team performance with a victory as well.

On behalf of the team, Coached Stephen Smith and Dan Dipple would like to extend gratitude to all parents, staff, administration, and community members who were part of this group's success.

A special thanks goes to White Cloud's Student Council under the direction of Courtney Dolan, which provided financial support to the club.

The chess squad would like to thank Bill Schmidt, Jamie Fletcher, Paula Vining, Kristine Wise, The Gates Foundation, and anonymous donors, whose sponsorship allowed for the purchase of chess boards and timers for competition.

The team also is grateful for the practice opportunities offered by the White Cloud Community Library, where Chadwick Walenga served as a wonderful host.

In the opening evening of match play, the Varsity A squad dismantled the opposition, with impressive triumphs over Newaygo, Grant, and Reed City. In the second round, the team rocketed past Chippewa Hills, Big Rapids, and Morley-Stanwood A.

In the finale, the Indians crushed Lakeview, Kent City, and Central Montcalm A. They totaled 2,710 points as a team, averaging an astounding 301.1 ppg in an incredible display of all-around team performance.

The Indians were led by Senior Jarrett Warlick' incredible 605 points. Mason D'Lamater followed with 170 points, Liam Povey garnered 130 points, and Captain Wyatt Karnes added 90 points.

For their efforts, each player received all-conference accolades and additional hardware in a line-up that featured two seniors, a junior, and two freshmen.

White Cloud's Varsity B establishing their authority early, dispatching Morley-Stanwood B and Reed City B. They later eclipsed Central Montcalm B and Big Rapids B.

In the finale, the team triumphed over Newaygo B and again against Big Rapids B. They only faltered in the final question of the match to lose a close one to Morley-Stanwood B.

Varsity B garnered 1,210 points as a team, with a 201.66 ppg average.

Leading Varsity B was Brian Loveless with 405 points, earning

him all-conference honors. Landon Edwards brought in 140 points, Captain Charlotte Karnes had 40 points, and Andi Gordon added 30 points. The latter three players each earned conference honorable mention for their performances.

The JV A defeated Kent City JV, Lakeview (175-60), a friendly match versus White Cloud JV C, and a close contest against Grant JV. The team scored 725 points in the league while averaging 120.83 points per game.

JV Captain Arsyn Balke earned 180 points, followed by 115 points from Trysten Tancock, 40 points from Kacie Kailing, 30 points from Adriana Alvarez-Smith, and 20 points from Rhoen Wade.

The Junior Varsity B excelled against Morley Stanwood Varsity B, Kent City, and Big Rapids JV. Brayden Perdue led the way with 185 points, while Kate McHaney ended with 170. Captain Annabelle Bird earned 120 points, followed by 10 points each from Kristy Irwin and Alice Hyde. The players amassed 930 total points, with a 132.85 ppg average.

The Junior Varsity C defeated Grant JV and White Cloud's JV A and JV B teams. Ayla Faulkner led the way with 125 points in her first outing. Lily Ulmen added 90 points, Lukas Huff brought in 70 points, Captain Leah Vining tallied 55 points, and Quin Rose rounded out the team effort with 10 points.

QB Finishes in Top Four at State Championship

White Cloud's quiz bowl team battled fiercely on their way to a fourth place finish in the 2025 Class C/D Michigan High School State Championship.

The state championships brought together 20 elite squads to the campus of Michigan State University.

The Indians ran up a string of three consecutive victories in the morning bracket on their way to the afternoon playoffs.

At a critical junction of the preliminary rounds, White Cloud decisively dispatched Carsonville-Port Sanilac 260-50. Next to fall was North Muskegon, 270-125, followed by Hackett Catholic Prep 290-120.

The Indians needed the resurgence after early-round stumbles to White Pigeon 165-210 and Jonesville 125-245.

Carrying momentum into the afternoon, the team defeated Sandusky 300-175, then lost a thriller to Saugatuck 170-175.

Pressed once more by adversity, the team was outlasted by Gwinn 130-345, the eventual Class C/D champion.

Remaining steadfast, White Cloud rebounded against Deckerville, 225-140. Yet, in the finale, the quintet succumbed to tournament runner-up Hillsdale Academy 170-345.

White Cloud racked up 2,105 total points and averaged an impressive 210.5 points per game on the day.

Individually, White Cloud was led by senior Jarrett Warlick's 625 total points, an average of 62.5 points per game. For his sensational efforts, Warlick was awarded Second-Team All-State honors as the 6th best of 113 competitors.



The team celebrated their top four finish at Chick-fil-A.

Liam Povey racked up 125 points, finishing as the tournament's 27th overall scorer. Senior captain Wyatt Karnes added 80 points to the team's total. And freshmen Mason D'Lamater and Brian Loveless contributed 25 and 10 points, respectively.

With this remarkable finish in the state tournament, White Cloud qualified for the national tournament for the 28th time.

It was the 36th occasion that White Cloud qualified for the state competition, an all-time Class C/D record, solidifying the legacy and tradition of the quiz bowl program.

Additionally, this performance marks the fifth straight year that the program has finished in the top four in the state tournament.

Coach Stephen Smith and the team extend their sincerest thanks to Coach Emeritus Tony McHattie, along with assistant coaches Arnie Baker, Kiranna Reynolds, Cameron Karnes, and Dallas Dowling for their dedication and support.

The team also wishes to express deep gratitude to the parents, teachers, administrators, donors, and community members whose unwavering encouragement continues to fuel the program's success.



White Cloud Public Schools continues to offer breakfast free to students. Breakfast is offered daily at the elementary school in the classrooms starting at 7:50 a.m. and in the junior high/high school cafeteria starting at 7:30 a.m.

As a friendly reminder, breakfast is available to any student who arrives late. If you are late, please check in at the office first.

Meet Up and Eat Up Summer Program

Our schools will continue to participate in this summer program. Meals will be available at the junior high entrance from 11 a.m. to noon.

The meal will include lunch and breakfast. Anticipated dates for this service will run from June 9 through August 1, Monday through Friday. Friday's meal pack will include meals for Saturday and Sunday.

Meal service will not be available on June 11 or the week of June 30 because the district will be closed to observe the July 4 holiday.

Meals may be picked up by students and parents or guardians. We are not allowed to provide students with meals for their siblings or have a family pick up for another family. These are some changes from the previous year by the state that we must follow. This is all based on our application and pending approval from the state.

Based upon this current information we may need to make changes to have our application approved. More information will be coming soon once the application has been approved.

Summer EBT is Back!

What are SUN Bucks?

SUN Bucks is the new name for the summer EBT. Eligible families of school-aged children will receive \$120 per child for qualifying groceries.

Families will be automatically enrolled in the SUN Bucks if they are already enrolled in the SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), or some types of Medicaid if you completed the Education

Benefit Form and receive free or reduced-price school meals.

Families that are not automatically enrolled should apply. For schools participating in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), it is especially important to spread the word. Families need to complete a Summer EBT/SUN Bucks application through the MI Bridges portal to receive these benefits. See the attached flyer for more information on how to apply.

Deadlines: Apply by April 15, 2025, to be eligible for the first issuance of benefits in May. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until August 31, 2025. The second issuance of benefits can be expected at the end of summer if you missed the deadline to apply.
