At the same time, I want to congratulate our Quiz Bowl and cross country teams for their recent successes.

The Quiz Bowl team finished in fifth place in the Jan Rademacher Invitational, and has also qualified to the 2022 NAQT National Championships in the Small-School Division. That tournament will be held in Chicago April 22-24, 2022.

Since 2004, the Quiz Indians have advanced to nationals 25 times, placing in the Top 10 of the U.S. 13 times. The team also made a bit of history in October, qualifying to the 2022 State Meet for the 33rd time, a Class C-D state record.

As for the cross country team, they took first place at five of the seven invitationals they competed in this season, and were CSAA Silver Division and state regional champions. Both championships were the first recorded at White Cloud.

The team finished a very respectable seventh at the state finals in Brooklyn, MI, and the entire team has earned Academic All-State honors.

Cross Country Coach Andrea Atwood was recognized by her coaching peers, who selected her as the Division 4 Region 29 Coach of the Year. Well done, coach and team!

The Board of Education meets the third Monday of each month in the HS Collaboration Room 306. Meetings are open to the public, and begin at 7:30 pm.





Sgt. First Class Justin Silverthorn Welcomed Home!

White Cloud schools honored one of our own, Sgt. First Class Justin Silverthorn, at the Veteran's Day Program on November 11.

Silverthorn graduated from White Cloud in 2001, and enlisted in the United States Army three months later. After completing airborne school, he was assigned to the 75th Ranger Regiment in the Ranger Indoctrination Program.

After completing this intense program, Silverthorn was assigned to the Second Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment. He served in the roles of rifleman, saw gunner, machine gunner, Gustav gunner, and fire team leader.

After leaving the 75th Ranger Regiment, he was assigned to the 4th Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, where he served four years as a scout team leader, squad leader, and platoon sergeant.

In 2010, Silverthorn was assigned to the 4th Ranger Training Battalion in Fort Benning, Georgia, where he served as a Ranger Instructor for three and a half years before moving to Fort Wainwright in Alaska.

He was stationed in Alaska for three years, then returned to the Airborne and Ranger Training Brigade in Ft. Benning for another three years.

Silverthorn has been deployed nine times, three to Afghanistan and six to Iraq.

On May 3, 2005, then Sgt. Silverthorn was on a routine cordon and search mission when his patrol received word of a potential improvised explosive device (IED) maker located in a house in his unit's sector.

His squad entered the house, where they came under enemy fire. At one point, two grenades were thrown toward Silverthorn's location. While the first grenade did not detonate, Silverthorn quickly shielded his comrades from the second grenade as it detonated.

He suffered fragmentation wounds and, for his bravery, was awarded the Army Commendation Medal for Valor and the Purple Heart.

During his years of service, Silverthorn also earned the Ranger Tab, Expert Infantry Badge, Combat Infantryman Badge, Airborne Wings, Meritorious Service Medal, 8 Oak Leaf Cluster, Good Conduct Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the Iraq Campaign Medal, Meritorious Unit Citation, and the Order of Saint Maurice.

After 20 years of active duty service, Silverthorn recently retired from the Army.

During his years of service, he created many friendships and lifelong bonds, not only with fellow soldiers but also with people living in the communities in which he was stationed and served.

We are so fortunate to have him back in our community! Justin is known to many as the guy who will get stuff done. From marketing and hosting events, to private meetings with those who just need to talk, to helping friends transport their kids to soccer practice. He is always willing to offer an extra hand.

Hunting has always been a huge part of his life. In the past several years, he has found it to be a therapeutic activity. While stationed at Fort Benning, Silverthorn was a member of the Gold Star Hunt Committee. The Gold Star Hunt is for the children of military personnel who have lost their lives serving our country.



During these hunts, Silverthorn and other members would divide up, each taking a child and cameraman. They arranged to not only hunt, but to teach the kids the value of the hunt, the best hunting practices, and gun safety.

When Silverthorn returned to White Cloud last spring, he teamed up with the National Wild Turkey Federation, White River Long Beards Chapter, at the Michael J. Hamm Memorial Jakes Event.

He was so excited to be involved with kids and helping to shape them into lifelong hunters!

Silverthorn is happily married to Jamie, and is a wonderful stepfather to Jaycee, Kyleah, Jorja and Kiera.





Dancing with Bulls

Tyler Washburn, a 2016 White Cloud graduate, won the regular season-ending Ultimate Bull Fighting competition held in Las Vegas November 5-7.

Tyler competed against 15 other bull fighters in the Las Vegas Invitational.

The win bumped his ranking to sixth in the world for Ultimate Bull fighters. His next completion was slated for the world finals, to be held in Fort Worth, Texas December 2-11.

In addition to his Las Vegas title, Tyler won the 2020 UBF-Sanctioned Freestyle Bullfight at the Skipper Voss "Let's Get Western" Tour in Jacksboro, Texas, was a 2020 UBF world finalist, and was the 2021 Lebo, Kansas UBF Reserve Champion.

The six-day, two-weekend 2021 UBF (Ultimate Bullfighting) World Finals at Fort Worth will crown the 2021 UBF World Champion. The 24 top freestyle bullfighters will split \$100,000 in prize money.

The UBF was launched in 2020 to showcase the acrobatic western discipline of freestyle bullfighting.

In freestyle bullfighting, a bullfighter competes for 60 seconds against a fighting bull predominantly of Spanish descent in an effort to score points for maneuvers performed during the one-minute competition. Unlike traditional bullfighting, the animals are not harmed.

Bullfighters are judged solely on their ability to perform gravity-defying acrobatic stunts as close to the bull as possible without getting hit.

The Fort Worth competition will feature a tiered, progressive elimination format until the 2021 UBF World Champion is crowned on Saturday, Dec. 11.

Tyler is in Pool B of the roster of 24 bullfighters.

The high-adrenaline action will get underway with pool play on Thursday, Dec. 2, and Friday, Dec. 3. Bullfighters in Pool A will compete on Dec. 2, followed by Pool B on Dec. 3.

On both nights, the pool of contenders will be split into four groups of three, with the top-performing bullfighter in each trio advancing to the next stage of competition on Saturday, Dec. 4.

On Dec. 4, the eight advancing bullfighters from Pool A and B will join the top four performing runner-up finishers. The 12 competing bullfighters will again be split into four



groups of three, with the top-performing contender in each grouping earning an automatic berth to Championship Saturday.

The action will resume Thursday, Dec. 9, with the Redemption Round, followed by the Wild Card Round on Friday, Dec. 10. Each day of competition will again showcase 12 bullfighters competing in four groups of three.

The Redemption Round will feature the 12 bullfighters who did not advance from the initial round of pool competition, while the Wild Card Round will include four winning bullfighters from Dec. 9 and the eight bullfighters who did not advance following the event on Dec. 4

The intense competition for the 2021 UBF World Finals will come to a climactic end Saturday, Dec. 11, when the top four bullfighters from Dec. 4 and the top four bullfighters from the Wild Card Round go head-to-head to earn one of four coveted positions in the winner-take-all shoot out round.

In the shoot-out championship round, the four advancing bullfighters will each take to the dirt one final time, with the top performer being crowned the 2021 UBF World Champion and collecting the accompanying \$25,000 bonus. ■

It was the year of “firsts” for the boys cross country team.

They finished first at five of the seven invitationals on the schedule.

They were champions of the CSAA Silver Division and state regional champions, both for the first time in school history.

And, for the first time, the boys dominated All-Conference distinctions, with seven of the team’s runners occupying the top 14 spots.

Nathan Ciolk, Kobe Canning and Coleson Cruzan earned CSAA first team recognition. Malachi Graves, Kaleb Canning, Carson Foondle and Christian Ringler earned conference honorable mention. Nathan, Kobe and Coleson were regional medalists.

The team finished their successful season with a trip to Brooklyn, MI to compete at the State Finals held at Michigan International Speedway.

The boys finished 7th among the best 27 division 4 teams in the state.

Nathan missed being All-State by just five positions, finishing in 35th place and crossing the line first for the Indians with a season-best time. Coleson was the fourth fastest freshman in the race, finishing in 54th place.

Kobe ended his high school cross country career with a 97th place finish and Academic All-State honors. Carson, also Academic All-State, was 113th; he moved up 85 places and was two minutes faster than last year.

Kaleb was 15th among the freshmen in the race, finished 132nd. Ashton Byle, also running his last high school cross country race, set a new personal best time of 18:43 and was 133rd.

Malachi, making his first appearance at the finals, finished 151st and also earned Academic All-State.

The entire boys team will also receive Academic All-State honors, in addition to the individuals already mentioned.

All season, the boys had an impressive 1-5 finishing spread, including the state finals, where the 1st-5th grouping was a time span of just 1:17. Nine of the boys posted personal best times at state.

Northmont, Ohio Wins Jan Rademacher Tourney

White Cloud's annual state and nationally sanctioned Jan Rademacher Memorial Quiz Bowl Invitational, held on Saturday, October 16, attracted a star-studded field of 19 teams representing 14 Ohio and Michigan powerhouse schools.

Twelve of the schools were 2021 state finalists, and six were 2021 national finalists.

At the 2021 NAQT National Championship last April, Roscommon placed 7th in the country, White Cloud was 10th, and White Pigeon finished 16th.

Also at White Cloud was Roscommon's All-American Jackson Thiel, the top U.S. scorer last season among Class C-D entrants at the individuals' National Championship.

White Cloud's Parker Karnes and Janessa Shepard last year placed 2nd and 3rd, respectively, behind Thiel.

At the invitational, all teams competed in nine rounds of competition. Class A Northmont (Ohio) defeated Class C Roscommon (Michigan) 465-190 to win the grand championship. Both schools were national finalists last April.

White Cloud Senior Captain Anthony Solis-Victoria was the team's leading varsity A scorer. Consequently, he won the prestigious Brian Derks Award presented annually to the most prolific Indian scorer in the tournament.

Solis-Victoria tallied 265 points to lead the Indians to a 6-3 record, just one toss-up question away from winning their tier and a trophy.

Juniors Zane Keith, Malachi Graves, and Tristan McHaney rounded out White Cloud's imbalanced scoring.

The Indicants finished in fifth place in their 2-tier division.

Roscommon won the two-tier, smaller-school division with a 9-0 record.

White Cloud's B trio, competing one person short and whose oldest members were two 9th graders, opted to take part in the varsity division.

Freshman Captain Wyatt Karnes averaged 33.3 points per game and ended up ranking 12th in scoring in the entire tournament.

Karnes, Mason D'Lamater and Lilyenne Sherwood performed laudably, defeating two varsity national finalists and earning 7th-place in their two-tier varsity division.

Ana Young and Brian Shaefer did not compete on October 16 but are key members of the Indians' squad.


Also in October, White Cloud made history by qualifying to the Class C-D portion of the 2022 State Meet for the 33rd time, a Class C-D state record. ■
